2. **The Item Store:** Facepunch curates and authorizes a weekly batch of skins, offering them straight through the Steam Item Store for a limited time at a set base rate (typically between £ 0.99 and £ 2.49).

When a skin leaves the official store, its fate is handed over to the player-driven Steam Community Market and third-party trading sites, where supply and need dictate its price.
