

Mastic, New York does not announce itself with the grandeur of a major city or the polish of a resort town. That is part of its appeal. It is a place shaped by shoreline weather, working families, summer visitors, and the long, practical business of making a community hold together. If you spend enough time here, you start noticing that Mastic has always been about endurance. Houses face salt air and nor'easters. Roads carry both daily commuters and weekend traffic.
