

Commack has a way of surprising people. On a map, it can look like just another Long Island hamlet tucked between more familiar names, but spend any time here and the place starts to reveal its character. It has old roads that still carry the memory of earlier settlements, shopping corridors that serve the everyday rhythm of suburban life, parks and preserves that give residents room to breathe, and a housing stock that tells the story of decades of growth.
