- **API Restrictions:** By restricting automated trade bots and implementing trade cooldowns, Valve has made it substantially harder for platforms to process instant deposits and withdrawals.
- **Account Bans:** Users captured utilizing their Steam inventories for industrial gambling operations risk having their individual Steam accounts permanently prohibited, leading to the loss of their whole game and skin libraries.

Despite these efforts, the demand stays so high that brand-new platforms constantly emerge to replace those that shut down.
