(Note: There is also a little chance of getting a StatTrak™ variation, which tracks the variety of kills made with that specific weapon, including a multiplier of approximately 10% shortage to the standard drop rates above.)

Valve Corporation designs the chances to show a lottery system, indicating that over a big sample size, players will lose more money in key purchases than they gain in unboxed skin values.

- **The Golden Dream:** Out of every 400 cases opened, statistically, just *one* player will unpack a Gold-tier item (Knife or Gloves).

- **The StatTrak Knife:** The odds of unboxing a StatTrak Knife are approximately 1 in 3,900.
- **The "Blue" Reality:** Roughly 8 out of every 10 cases opened will yield a standard, low-value Mil-Spec blue skin that may just be worth a couple of cents on the Community Market.
