- **Validate Authenticity:** Use the Steam Community Market or reputable third-party markets (e.g., BitSkins, Buff163) to avoid fake cases.
- **Think About Storage Costs:** Physical storage (if you trade externally) can include concealed costs; keep cases in your Steam stock to avoid surcharges.
- **Diversify Portfolio:** Combine high-value operation cases with more cost effective legacy cases to balance risk.
- **Stay Updated on Operations:** Valve regularly re-issues older cases during "Legacy" occasions; knowing statements can help you act rapidly.
