The Importance of Clear Game Format and Round Structure

Beyond just teasing themes, an effective game description should aim to clarify the **format** and **round structure** without overwhelming or confusing the reader.

Technical jargon or complex gaming terms can alienate or confuse players, especially newcomers to digital games. This drives some designers and platforms to simplify language in blurbs, sometimes at the cost of precision.

For example, instead of saying "This RTP (return to player) is 96.2%," a vague blurb might say "Enjoy fair and rewarding gameplay." Such phrasing is intentionally general but leaves many players wondering about actual odds.

That said, it's crucial for descriptions to strike a balance—using plain-English where possible but also providing links or references to detailed, unambiguous instructions and terms. Platforms like Bingoplus and comprehensive game directories often include separate help sections that do exactly this.

Feature Trigger Conditions and Limitations: Why They Matter
