- **Set rigorous financial limits:** Treat gambling purely as a form of home entertainment with an established budget plan, rather than a trustworthy method to earn money.
- **Protect your Steam account:** Enable Steam Guard Two-Factor Authentication (2FA) and never log into your Steam account on unproven third-party domains.
