A community shaped by growth, but not by erasure

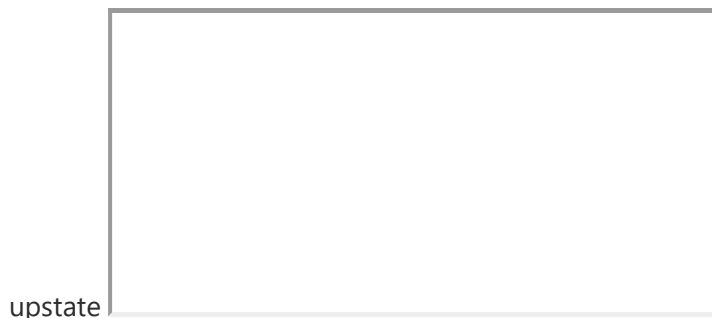
