

Palm Beach Gardens does not announce itself with the kind of grit or age that marks Florida's older coastal towns. It feels younger, more deliberate, and a little more polished. That impression is not an accident. The city grew out of a planned vision, shaped by land ownership, postwar development, and a long stretch of South Florida reinvention. Yet beneath the manicured medians, golf greens, and retail corridors, there is a deeper local story that reaches back through agriculture, rail access, migration, and the very specific geography of Palm Beach County.
